### From Mrs Blaker

I hope everyone had a great week of half term. We are so pleased to be back in school and ready to start another productive term. I am really excited to launch my half termly book club this week. Every half term I will choose three books for Reception –Year 1, Years 2-4 and Years 5-6. Parents have the option to borrow or buy the book for their children. All children who have read the book will then join me for a book club meeting in the week before the holidays. This is an entirely voluntary activity for children (and parents!) who wish to participate. If children would like to read out of their allotted year group book that is also fine. I make a point of choosing newly released books to introduce the children to as much new fiction as possible.

I run Mrs Blaker's book club because I love reading, but also because Reading for Pleasure is absolutely vital to a child's educational success. Research shows us that children who read widely in their own time have greater academic achievement across all subject areas, right the way through secondary school and into adult life. Reading supports vocabulary development, comprehension, knowledge about the world and all writing has its base in reading. The single best thing that you can do for your child is to encourage them to read regularly and widely. And it doesn't need to be 'great' literature or fiction. It should be geared around their interests and include newspapers, magazines, graphic novels, poetry and non fiction. I'm always happy to talk with parents about encouraging reading and supporting children who find this difficult.

# Security Update

Our security measures continue to stay in place, and as the conflict in Israel continues we must maintain our current level of vigilance. Parents are reminded not to enter school unless they have a pre-booked appointment and they are wearing a 'visitors' lanyard. We need to account for all adults in school and although you are known to some staff members, you will not be known to all. Unidentified packages should not be brought into school. Parents should leave school quickly at the end of the day and avoid congregating where possible. When entering school via the school gate please make sure it is closed behind you and that no one is let in. Please report anything unusual to our security team who will alert Police and CST where necessary.

Could I also ask parents to be mindful of the information that is shared via Whatsapp and social media. As you know, not everything is accurate and anxieties can be heightened – sometimes unnecessarily.

Thank you so much for all your support in keeping our children safe, and please join me in Tefillah for the safety of all affected by this conflict.



### What we are learning this week



#### Reception

This week we have had a fabulous week learning through the text of 'Old Mikamba Had a Farm.' This is about an African farmer similar to 'Old Mcdonald.' We learnt about the differences between African farms and farms we visit in England. We learnt about different kinds of animals. Phonics has been brilliant and the children are now in different groups and will get different reading activities each week. In Maths, we have continued with White Rose learning about comparing and sorting directly linking to the Early Years framework. We loved making animal biscuits and baking banana bread. Adopt a Pet week has been fantastic and we have loved seeing how the children looked after their pets at home. Thank you for all your support.

#### Year 1

English - we have been learning a new poem and used actions to help us recite the poem. Our topic in the next two weeks poetry, focus on rhyming words and adjectives.

Maths - This week we focused on sort, count and represent objects. We also recognised numbers as words.

Computing - We have been learning about pictograms and we made our own pictogram using purple mash.

We had our first session with Mika, our Israeli Shinshinit. We played 'getting to know you' games and had lots of fun with her.

#### Year 2

This week in Maths we have been partitioning numbers up to 100 using part/whole models. We have also been writing numbers to 100 in expanded form.

In English, we have been learning the words and actions for our new story: Alfie's Star. The children have been working on identifying recurring language, sequence adverbs and similes in the story.

We have started a really exciting new project in Art. Over the next few weeks, we will be making our own felt! In preparation, this week we looked at maps as inspiration for art and drew our own maps of a familiar journey. We will then use this as inspiration for our felt-making. Watch this space!

In History, we learnt about the story of Guy Fawkes and the Gunpowder Plot. We read the poem that starts: "Remember, remember the 5th of November" to help us think about the meaning of words such as 'treason' and plot'. It also got everyone very excited for bonfire night!

#### Year 3

In Maths this week, year 3 have been learning about representing numbers to 100, partitioning numbers to 100 and using number lines.

In English this week, year 3 have been innovating a modelled newspaper report to make it their own and continued on to plan their own newspaper report.

In Science this week, year 3 started their new topic of light. We used mystery bags with strange items inside and they had to guess what was inside without a light source. After, they added a light source they had to draw what was actually inside the bag.

#### Year 4

In Maths we have been revising place value and looking at representing numbers up to 10,000. In English we are starting to write our own non chronological report on Ogres. We have learnt a story map this week, looking at the features of a non-chronological report. In Science, we have started our new topic of States of Matter, looking at the different properties of a solid, liquid and a gas.

### Year 5

This week in Maths we have been learning at numbers up to 1,000,000 and used manipulatives to prove our place value bar models. In English, we started learning about poems and performed some with expression! We finished our Science topic: properties and changes of materials and have started our new exciting space science unit, just in time for our space workshop on Monday.

#### Year 6

During our Art, we have been creating photomontages using magazines and brochures. In Maths, we have learnt about multistep multiplication problems and long division. In English, we have been using different clauses that we could include in a nonchronological report. We were excited to start our new Light Science unit and enjoyed investigating how to change the shape of a shadow.



### This week in Ivrit

Reception: The children played an interactive whiteboard game to find objects that are said in Ivrit by tapping on the picture. We recapped our vocabulary learning of the words, 'Shalom', 'Boker tov', 'Shabbat Shalom' and 'Ani' and we learnt a new word 'Hine ani'- here I am.

- Year 2: We practiced writing the Ivrit letters Alef Mem using a supporting video to help us write the letters in the correct way.
- Year 3: We practiced reading all the Ivrit letters in order with the vowel 'Ah'.
- Year 4: We read one/two syllable words that contain the vowel 'O' and 'OO' in pairs and played interactive games.
- Year 5: We read one/two syllable words that contain the vowel 'OO' in pairs and played interactive games with these words. We also played 'four in a row 'with all the Ivrit letters and learnt vowels.
- Year 6: We read one/two syllable words that contain the vowel 'OO' in pairs and played interactive games with these words. Some children challenged themselves and practised writing them in script letters.

### This week in JS

- Year 2: We learnt about light and why Judaism teaches about the light of creation and the sun, the moon and the stars. We thought about how we use light to celebrate, protect and symbolise ideas.
- Year 3: We began our learning about Tzedakah and Chesed and learnt that tzedakah is the word which we often translate as charity, but really means justice and fairness.
- Year 4: We began learning the blessing of Birkat Hamazon known as 'bonei Yerushalayim' building of Jerusalem and the reason we think of Jerusalem in our grace after meals.
- Year 5: We learnt about Tzedakah and Chesed and particularly the idea that Rabbi Eleazar believed that one act of tzedakah filled the world with chesed and that acts of chesed can be done by everyone.
- Year 6: We had a special lesson learning about the Talmud and the laws of Chanukah and discovered that we light the Chanukiah according to the School of Hillel as people who take extra, extra care in their keeping of Jewish practice.

We spoke about the importance of 'reading' people's faces and body language to understand how they are feeling and why it is important to understand how someone else is feeling, as well as have others understand how they are feeling. They enjoyed making emotions wheels which they have chosen to either keep in school, or bring home, as an alternative way of expressing their feelings.
