- Before reading: do you think Julius might finally let Waffles hug him?

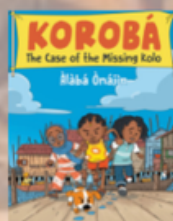


Koroba and The Case of the Missing Kolo by Alaba Onajin
